Biology Classes Explore Animal Kingdom Through Dissection

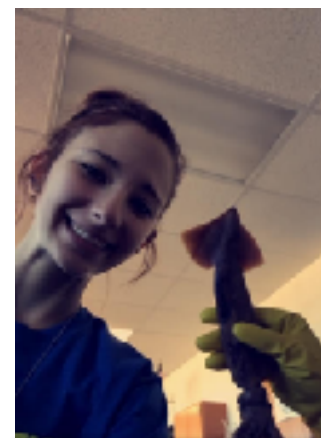

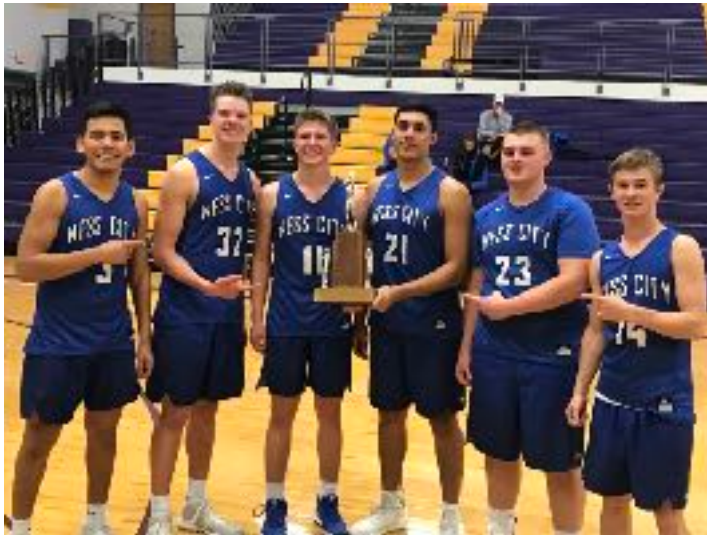
NCHS Eagles Off to a Hot Start

In the regular season we beat Macksville 67-40, Hodgeman County 77-41, Kinsley 67-30, and Dighton 71-24. Coming out of Christmas break, we have our

7th road game in a row when we play at St. John. One thing we have focused on this season is defense. The boys have bought into the scheme and have been playing very tough defense. We currently give up 35 points per game while scoring 66 points per game.

CRISIS DRILLS CONTINUE AT USD #303

As many of you are aware, schools in the state of Kansas are now required to perform nine crisis drills per year. Crisis drills could be any situation that could interrupt the school day. So far this year our drills have covered: 1) if a “bad person” comes to the school, 2) what to do in case of an evacuation, 3) an enhanced fire drill, 4) stranger on the playground or in the building, and 5) if a student is missing in a crisis (such as a fire). The subject of each crisis drill is determined by our District Crisis Team with the assistance of local law enforcement. Before the drill, the staff is given directions for that particular drill. The teachers then discuss the drills and procedures with the students. Once the drill is over, teachers meet and debrief about the drill and discuss any procedures that need to be changed.

Going through these drills has been beneficial to help students and staff better understand and practice procedures for different possible crises. We will continue to communicate the crisis drills to students and parents through the school’s Facebook and Twitter pages or a letter home.

SOFTBALL TEAM COUNTING DOWN TO FIRST SEASON OPENER!

In 92 days, the Ness City Lady Eagles Softball Team will take the field for the first time in our school’s history!
